Fruit and vegetable voucher project to address food insecurity

Food insecurity is an official term from the United States Department of Agriculture. Food insecurity means lacking the resources to purchase the quality or quantity of food that is needed to live a healthy life. Simply put, it refers to when people don't have enough quality food to eat. There are many causes of food insecurity, such as inflation, high living costs, unemployment, low wage jobs, medical emergencies, or family crises.

It's important to understand that it can happen to anyone and is not a consequence of personal failure. Food insecurity can have serious consequences on individuals' and families' health and well-being.

The Bremer County Health Department and Waverly-Shell Rock Area United Way have partnered together to offer the Fruit and Vegetable Voucher project to address food insecurity for individuals and families in need. To support the health and well-being of people in our local communities, Bremer County Health Department Administrator, Lindley Sharp notes "Addressing food insecurity requires coordinated efforts and by partnering with the WSR Area United Way, we can better target the 1,360 individuals experiencing food insecurity in Bremer County." United Way Director, Jill Krall, acknowledges the pertinent timing of this partnership stating, "We know that local families are struggling as grocery costs are rising. The produce voucher program ensures local families have access to healthy food choices, especially during the summer months when kids are home from school."





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Readlyn Community Fund's Second Annual Award Night

Sunday, June 2 was the second annual award night hosted by the Readlyn Community Fund. For years, the Readlyn Community Fund was an affiliate of the Community Foundation of Northeast Iowa (CFNEIA) and distributed funds through the CFNEIA's platform. To provide a stronger connection and greater local impact, the Readlyn Community Fund established its own 501(c)3 at the start of 2023.

The mission of the Readlyn Community Fund is to provide support for future projects directly benefiting the people of Readlyn through an annual grant process. The current committee members of the RCF (Readlyn Community Fund) are Kyle Shores, Jaci Hogan, Jill Krall, Amy Sheppard, Danny Sickles, Jill Schwickerath and Sharon Davis. For the 2024-2025 grant cycle, the RCF was able to award four local organizations their full grant request.

The first recipient of the award night was Wapsie Valley Readlyn Elementary's 6th grade teacher Heather Robinson for \$1,420.97. These funds will be used to help upgrade the 6th grade science curriculum to the OpenSciEd curriculum as well as purchasing the corresponding kits to help teach the curriculum.

The second recipient of the 2024-2025 grant cycle was the Readlyn Fire Department. RFD was awarded \$5,000 to go towards acquiring a Turnout Gear (firefighting PPE) washer/extractor. This extractor is an industry standard that is used to remove carcinogens from firefighting gear after a fire. Ultimately, this unit will help lower the risk of Readlyn's volunteer firefighters being diagnosed with cancer because of harmful toxins. Community Lutheran School was the third recipient of the night, and the school was awarded \$2,474.77 to help the faculty implement STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) education earlier and more consistently from preschool to 8th grade. Receiving the initial building blocks of STEAM will prepare students for a constantly developing digital world.

Final recipient of the 2024-2025 grant cycle was the Northeast Iowa Food Bank with an award value of \$5,000. This grant request will aid the local backpack program that assists many families in the Readlyn community and surrounding communities. The program partners with Wapsie Valley School District to help provide non-perishable and nutritious foods to help sustain children over the weekends throughout the school year.

All organizations were exceedingly grateful for the support of the Readlyn Community Fund. The next annual RCF grant cycle will coincide with Bremer County Foundations' grant cycle in 2025 so please, if you know an organization that would benefit from applying, please spread the word! 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Apply now for Homestead Tax Credit, Exemption 65+ & Military Exemption

The Bremer County Assessor's Office would like to remind property owners to sign up for the Homestead Tax Credit if you have purchased or built a new home within the last 12 months or have not signed up previously. This credit is a direct reduction in the amount of property tax you pay.

In addition to the Homestead Tax Credit, claimants who are 65 years of age or older on or before January 1 of the assessment year are eligible for a Homestead Tax Exemption. An exemption is a reduction in the taxable value of the property rather than a direct reduction in the amount of property tax you pay.

Eligibility for the Homestead Credit & the Homestead Exemption: You must own and occupy the property as your primary homestead on July 1 of each year, declare residency in Iowa for income tax purposes and occupy the property for at least six months each year. Once a property owner qualifies for the credit and/or exemption, the credit and exemption continue until the property is sold or until the owner no longer qualifies. Please refer to Iowa Code, Chapter 425.

Property owners may be eligible for a Military Tax Exemption. Again, an exemption is a reduction in the taxable value of the property rather than a direct reduction in the amount of property tax you pay.

Eligibility for the Military Tax Exemption: You must be a resident of Iowa, have been involved in full-time active duty during a war or conflict, be a veteran defined by Iowa Code 35.1* or served 18 months active duty and have been honorably discharged. (The original or a certified copy of the DD214 must be recorded in the Bremer County Recorder's Office by July 1 the year the exemption is first claimed. Your DD214 needs to show release from active duty during a qualified time for other than training purposes.) Once a property owner qualifies for the exemption, the exemption will continue until the property is sold or until the owner no longer qualifies. Surviving spouses remain eligible for the exemption as long as they do not remarry and the exemption continues until the property owner is no longer eligible. Please refer to Iowa Code, Chapter 427.

Disabled Veteran Homestead Tax Credit: Refer to Code of Iowa, Chapter 425.15. For more detailed information on this credit, please see the assessor's page on the Bremer County Website under Credits & Exemptions, call the Bremer County Veteran's Affairs Office at 319-352-4209 or reach out to the Bremer County Assessor's Office.

Filing deadlines for these credits & exemptions: For the 2024 valuation the deadline is July 1, 2024. (After July 1 all applications would be considered for the following year.) Please note: The same application is used for both the Homestead Tax Credit and the Homestead Tax Exemption.

*House File 259 recently updated Iowa's definition of a veteran. Individuals may now qualify for the Military Tax Exemption if they were members of the National Guard or Reserves who have a VA service-connected disability.

The Readlyn City Council met in open session on Monday, June 10, 2024 at 6:45PM for the Finance Committee to review bills and at 7:00 PM for the regular meeting. Meeting was called to order by Councilman Franck due to the absence of the mayor and mayor pro-tem. 
