The Iowa State Fair's Mr. Legs, A.K.A. Ben Hogan

The Iowa State Fair has hosted a Mr. Legs competition for decades. In 2019, Ben Hogan decided to make the trip to Des Moines for the contest. Ben has always had muscular legs, a result from being an athlete throughout his youth, playing football at Wartburg College, and genetics from his maternal grandma (who was referred to as "Legs" in her obituary) and his dad. Ben oiled, tanned, and shaved his legs. He left the 2019 Iowa State Fair with the title of Mr. Legs and held on to his crown for 2020 and 2021

In 2022, Ben returned to the contest but found a new competitor. A young body builder entered the competition and won, reducing Ben to second place for 2022 and 2023. Ben decided to get serious. He earnestly lifted weights, exercised, and his diet started Monday. Ben lost 75 pounds. The last week of July 2024, Ben made a trip to Arizona with his son, Caleb, brother, Joah, and friend, Aaron Ramsey. The group hiked the Grand Canyon's Rim-to-Rim: an arduous trek of descending 14.3 miles and 6,000 feet of elevation from the North Rim to the bottom of the canyon, then climbing 4,500 feet elevation and 9.6 miles back out again at the South Rim. After the strenuous hike, Ben's calves were now ready to revive his Mr. Legs title at the State Fair.

Ben returned to the fair in August 2024

and paraded his chiseled legs on the Mid-American stage at the Mr. Legs Contest. He once again was crowned the Iowa State Fair's Mr. Legs and well deserving. Ben said the best part of the contest is that it is good clean fun, and it brings his family and friends together. Although it seems that the contest is usually on the hottest and busiest fair day, Ben's family, Readlyn friends, and friends from high school showed up and excitedly cheered him on with 133,000 other people in attendance at the fair (which was a record). He modestly

claims that he "looks good from the waist down." Jaci, Ben's wife, was called "one lucky lady" by another woman at the fair.

Mr. Legs is just a small part of Ben's accomplishments. Ben and Jaci own Tru-Serve Insurance. Having a truck driver for a dad, Ben developed an interest in trucks and insurance for another company for about ten years. He and Jaci took a leap of faith and started TruServe in a garage in Denver. They are now located in Readlyn with 12 employees. In addition,

Delbert Oltrogge to note 85th birthday


Delbert Oltrogge will celebrate his 85th birthday on November 3 with a card shower. A family dinner is being held.



Readlyn Community Library Statistics for Fiscal Year 2023-2024



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

Extension council members are elected at large, and all voters in the county are eligible to vote for four candidates.





"Financial Fitness"

WITH ASHLEA (KLEITSCH) JONES

Have you ever thought about how deer hunting aligns with saving for retirement? I have been in the tree stand a lot lately, which gives me a lot of time to ponder these kinds of things!

This year is the first time I had the pleasure of taking both of our boys (and sometimes their little sister even tagged along) out for youth deer season. There are so many things you can learn in the dirt that can shape the human you are and the way you are conditioned to cope with future failures and successes. It has been a joy to have these conversations with these little humans that are growing up way too fast.



- **1. Patience.** You can do everything right and still not reach the goal you had in mind. You bought the ammo, sighted in your weapon, scouted out where to put your tree stand, and got up early to be there for the sunrise. There is still no guarantee that the big buck will walk your way and you'll make the perfect shot to take him down. You might sit for hours and only see a squirrel but you won't see anything if you aren't out there.
- **2. Consistency.** Not every venture to the woods is going to be fun and full of action. It may be days, weeks or even years before you reap the seeds you sow. Sometimes it will be cold. Sometimes you might have to walk for miles. Sometimes you must carry your heavy equipment through uneven terrain. Do it anyway.
- **3. "Farm your own farm".** There will be people you know who get their deer before you and same goes with their life successes. They'll show you pictures and tell you stories that will make you feel like you must be doing something wrong to not have your own successes yet. Nobody brags about their failures and missteps but it's a mistake to think you are the minority. Life is hard and achieving any good goal is hard. Keep your head down and stick to the plan.
- **4. Appreciate the people who helped you.** There is rarely if EVER something earned that is strictly a solo effort. To hunt, we had a friend give us permission to access their land. Another who let us sit in one of their stands. A third who said we could borrow a gun anytime we needed. Everyone involved was checking in to see if we had any luck they truly cared about helping and fostering a good experience for my kids. Sometimes help shows up as a physical gift, sometimes financial, sometimes a word of encouragement or perspective that helps you get to the next level. There are so many intelligent people out there who are willing to be generous with their time and resources if you remain open and grateful for their partnerships. Always stay humble and kind!
- **5.** The only consistency in life is the lack there of. Everyone is different whether deer hunting or financial planning. One of my boys is a little slower to pull the trigger ... mentally checking off all the nerves and factors. Our other son is chomping at the bit to take a shot. As a mom and financial advisor, the advice I provide is only effective if it is spoken in a way that is cohesive with the person receiving it. It is my job to meet you where you are and to mitigate obstacles in an effective and palatable manner.

Hoping that all the youth hunters, adult hunters, farmers, wage workers, business owners, and anyone shooting for big goals finds the courage to stay the course! If it pertains to financial success, let us be your guide!



NEWS FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Open Enrollment 2025-26 School Year

March 1 - Application deadline for students in grades 1-12 to open enroll for the upcoming school year.

March 2 - Applications for students grades 1-12 will be denied unless the parent or guardian is able to demonstrate good cause.

Open Enrollment Application for the 2025-2026 School Year -

The application and process for open enrollment are outlined in the open enrollment application. Please mail, email, or fax copies of the application to your resident school district and the district you would like for your child to attend. For contacts, addresses, or fax numbers for school districts, please visit the districts' websites. Do not send your application to the Iowa Department of Education.

The following circumstances are considered "good cause" and are acceptable conditions for a timeline waiver for open enrollment if the change occurred or be-

gan after March 1 (or September 1):

- Change in family district of residenceChange in child's residence from one
- Change in child's residence from one parent or guardian to the residence of a different parent or guardian
- Change in the state in which the family residence is located
- Change in the marital status of the student's parents resulting in a change in resident district
- Change in guardianship or custody proceeding that results in a change in resident district
- Placement of the child in foster care resulting in a change of residence
 - Adoption
- Participation in a foreign exchange program
- Initial placement of a preschool student in a special education program requiring SDI
- Participation in a substance abuse or mental health treatment program resulting in a change of residence
- Change in the status of a child's resident district such as removal of accredita-

tion by the Iowa State Board of Education (State Board), surrender of accreditation, or permanent closure of a private school after March 1

- Revocation of a charter school contract as provided in section 256F.8
- Failure of district negotiations for whole grade sharing or the rejection of a whole grade sharing agreement after March 1*
- Failure of district negotiations for reorganization or rejection of a proposed reorganization plan after March 1*
- Failure of district negotiations for a dissolution agreement after March 1*
- Loss of accreditation or permanent closure of a private school after March 1

Circumstances not defined above that would be considered good cause (and subject to the approval of the board of the resident district and the board of the receiving district) include:

- Repeated student harassment that the resident district cannot adequately address or
 - The child has a serious health condi-

tion that a school district cannot adequately address

JH/HS Facility Improvements

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"Grandpa Bob"

The morning light was gray and cloudy with little wind and a sharp cold feeling as I walked alongside him in the light wisp of snow covering the rocks along a set of railroad tracks. Sparrows flew around us landing on the brush and grass fluttering in the snow. I gripped the Sears and Roebuck single shot 20 gauge shotgun that he bought me and trimmed the stock on just so it would fit me correctly. Then I caught the slightest movement under a bush and he told me take your time, I raised the gun and slowly settled the bead on the big fluffy winter-coated rabbit. I was shaking like a leaf as I squeezed the trigger to hear him say "You got him!! Your first rabbit!"

The man with me in this story is my grandfather, Bob Nefzger. This month I'm going to tell you about one of my biggest outdoor influences.

Over time, I've had many influences on my outdoor obsession from my dad, uncles, and many that weren't relatives. However, probably my biggest influence, especially at an early age, was Grandpa Bob. My parents separated when I was very young, which, while not exactly ideal, gave me the opportunity to spend a lot of time with my grandparents, Bob and Marge Nefzger, my mother's parents. They reside in Delaware, Iowa, in the same house they've been living in nearly all my life.

Grandpa Bob, now 86, and Grandma Marge, now 87, were the hardest working folks I think I've ever known. Grandma worked at Ertl Toys in Dyersville for a long career retiring from there in the '90s.

Grandpa worked his career at Henderson Manufacturing in Manchester, Iowa, retiring from there with over 30 years of service. My very early years with Grandpa and Grandma they both could tell I was obsessed with the outdoors with stories they've told me of a three-year-old sitting in my red wagon with a hammer hanging off the back (my boat motor) pretend fishing in the yard for hours or a five-year-old sitting behind the wheel of Grandpa's old Ford truck rolling down the window telling them I was heading to Canada on a fishing trip, I'll be back in a week!

I would spend Saturday morning at their house, not watching cartoons, but

instead "World Championship Fishing" with Virgil Ward on PBS. As I got older, Grandpa really fueled my obsession with fishing. Just south of Delaware, just off Highway 20, is a small lake we simply call "The Pond." The pond is where all my fishing truly began. Grandpa would take me there very often starting with bluegills and working my way up to the big bass that resided in the pond.

As I said earlier, Grandpa worked hard at Henderson's and oftentimes that meant long hours. I would wait in the driveway each evening for Grandpa's Ford Tempo to come around the corner from work with my fishing gear in hand. Looking back, I can imagine how tired he must have been after a long day, but I don't remember him telling me



no, we can't go. A lot of times we would fish from shore, but on some occasions Grandpa would hook up his flat-bottom boat and I felt like I was Virgil Ward casting for bass from the front of that jon boat. When the trolling motor battery would wear out, Grandpa would paddle the boat in circles around that pond just because I wanted to troll spinners for crappies and bluegills on those warm summer evenings.

As I got older, Grandpa taught me a lot in the garage as he could fix anything. At those times, fixing was out of absolute necessity, but Grandpa taught me how to make things last and fix everything myself. He definitely instilled my love of tinkering and my habit of collecting and keeping everything just because it might come in handy someday. (Aubrey might not like that part so much.)

For many years, I was Grandpa's sidekick no matter the project. When I neared the age of 11 or 12, I got to tag along on hunts with Grandpa, being the bird dog flushing rabbits and pheasants. Grandpa loved to bird hunt around Delaware County and I longed for the day when I got to carry a shotgun, too.

One day, Grandpa came home a little later from work and he was carrying a black and brown gun case. He had a grin on his face that Grandpa could only show when he was up to something. He said, "Open the zipper," and my mind went wild with excitement, I can't believe I didn't break the zipper opening the case hastily. Inside, I found the most beautiful gun I'd ever seen at the time as Grandpa said, "It's yours, Buddy, myself and your two uncles paid for it." I can only imagine the size of my eyes as I hugged Grandpa. "Can we go-" I couldn't finish the sentence as Grandpa held a box of Federal 20 gauge 8 shot shells in his hand. "Yep, let's go!"

After shooting, Grandpa decided the gun was a touch too long and we worked together to shorten the stock. I'll never forget Grandpa taping off the cut line so carefully and cutting on his homemade band saw. We then finished it with a new coat of wood stain and it fit like a glove.

That gun led to many hunts with Grand-

pa like that first rabbit to first pheasants. That gun still resides in my gun safe today with pride.

These days, Grandpa doesn't get around as good as he used to, and I don't see him nearly as much as I should with my schedule and work ethic that started with him. But I wanted him to read this and remember where it all started and how much all those times and memories mean to me. I always talk about passing it on and, Grandpa, you sure passed it on to me and you don't get nearly enough credit for it! I love you and Grandma both!

As I end this month's column, to all my readers, just remember a lot of little things end up being the biggest things and do what you can to get kids outdoors. And as I always say, until next time.... GET OUT-DOORS!



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
